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From the Library Director

Welcome back! We're looking forward to a busy fall semester, with faculty lectures, an election season civic engagement fair, a fall migration "Flyways Citizen Science" film screening and lecture, Inclusive Reading Club meetings, and lots of information literacy instruction in classes throughout the curriculum.

The library team is closely monitoring developments in artificial intelligence and its impact on research, scholarly communication, and critical thinking. We welcome conversations and would appreciate hearing your thoughts and questions about AI in your field and teaching. By faculty request, we are also adapting instruction to include information about AI and judicious use of AI tools in information literacy instruction.

The library has significantly expanded access to scholarly resources with a new subscription to Proquest Academic One, which adds 13,000 full-text scholarly journal titles, 2,300 news publications including *The Boston Globe* and international titles, full-text access to dissertations and theses, and ABI Inform's Market and Industry reports, company profiles, and case studies.



The library was able to negotiate this new subscription within Salve's budget constraints through our annual evaluation process for e-resource subscriptions. This process includes analysis of total usage, cost-per-use, and other measures to help us determine which resources to cancel so that the library can identify funds to purchase new subscriptions and continue to support the evolution of the curriculum.

If you especially appreciate a specific library database or the book collection, assigning your students to use that specific resource for your assignments is a great way to help us demonstrate that we have the database usage or checkout numbers to justify continuing subscriptions in a tight budget environment.

More about **Proquest's databases**

- Proquest Central brings together many of Proquest's databases in one place to create a large
 multidisciplinary research source. It provides access to databases across all major subject areas,
 including business, health and medical, social sciences, arts and humanities, education, science
 and technology, and religion. The collection includes thousands of full-text scholarly journals,
 trade and professional titles, newspapers, magazines, working papers, case studies, and market
 reports.
- <u>Proquest Dissertations & Theses Global</u> provides a collection of multi-disciplinary dissertations and theses from around the world, offering over 5 million citations and 3 million full-text works from thousands of universities.
- <u>ABI/INFORM</u> provides access to business resources, including full-text journals, working papers, company/country/industry-focused reports, major news sources like the *Wall Street Journal*, and key business and economics periodicals such as *The Economist* and *Sloan Management Review*.

The Films on Demand database is no longer available, but the library is able to purchase access to individual videos from this database if they are required viewing for a class. To request access to a video, please complete the <u>course reserve request</u>

<u>form</u>. Please also consider the thousands of videos immediately available in the <u>Academic Video Online</u> database, which the library continues to subscribe to.

Six new <u>Gale primary sources collections</u> related to the Holocaust are now available. These collections include Nazism in Poland: The Diary of Governor-General Hans Frank, Correspondence from German Concentration Camps and Prisons, Jewish Underground Resistance: The David Diamant Collection, Nuremburg Laws and Nazi Annulment of Jewish German Nationality, German Anti-Semitic Propaganda, and Nazi Bank and Financial Institutions: U.S. Military Government Investigation Reports and Interrogations of Nazi Financiers, 1945-1949. Access to these collections is made possible through the generosity of the Blumen family.


- *Measuring Light in the Night kit* includes high quality light meter, infrared flashlight, Data sheet

SalveVotes Vote Early Day/SRU Civic Engagement Fair



From the Archives and Special Collections

One mid-August day fifty years ago, Newport locals and tourists woke up to find Monumenta, an exhibition of over fifty monumental, modern sculptures, scattered throughout town. While some thought of the sculptures as eyesores diminishing the beauty of Newport's 19th century architecture, others recognized the cultural significance of a contemporary exhibition that hauled Newport into the 20th century art scene.

A group of Middletown and Newport community members and Princeton University art history scholars formed Monumenta, a non-profit organization, in 1974. Monumenta organizers William Crimmins, Sam Hunter, Hugh Davies, and Nancy Rosen worked tirelessly with Newport city officials, shipping and insurance companies, lenders, and artists to mount a 54-piece exhibition of modern sculpture throughout Newport to be viewed by the public. The exhibition titled *Sculpture in Environment* was commonly referred to as Monumenta, and opened on the night of August 16 with a symposium hosted at the Rosecliff mansion and ran until October 13.

Monumenta brought monumental, modern sculpture out from esoteric museum environments and to the public. The exhibition provided a rare opportunity to see a variety of 20th century sculpture from well-established and less well-known artists alike. Sculptures by Willem de Kooning, Barnett Newman, Henry Moore, and Claes Oldenburg were displayed alongside novices like Richard Fleischner and Anne Healy (at right, Healy's *Hot Lips*

was suspended above Goose Neck Pond). Monumenta installed sculptures in different public locations throughout the city of Newport, including Brick Market Place, the grounds of the Elms and Chateau-sur-Mer, and Bleak House Point and Brenton State Park. One unique environmental sculpture created by Bulgarian-born artist Christo involved covering the water on King's Cove Beach with 150,000 square feet of polypropylene fabric. All sculptures were returned to their lenders at the conclusion of the exhibition except for Richard Fleischner's *Sod Maze*, an earthwork still displayed on the lawn of Chateau-sur-Mer. Monumenta gave Newport and its visitors the freedom to experience 20th century modern art outside of an intimidating museum context, and in a more familiar one throughout the city.

I began research on Monumenta in Spring 2024 when I participated in the Preservation Society of Newport County's internship program. At the PSNC, I created a finding aid for an archive on Monumenta in the Smithsonian's Archives for American Art. I also found and summarized articles about Monumenta in local news publications, like the *Newport Daily News* and *Providence Journal*, as well as national magazines, like *Time*, *Vogue*, and *House & Garden*. I was thrilled to continue my research and collect more information and photographs about Monumenta in Salve Regina's Special Collections over the summer as a student assistant in the University Archives. Under the guidance of University Archivist and Special Collections Librarian Liza Tietjen, I curated an exhibit on the third floor of McKillop Library to introduce students and faculty to Monumenta. Archivist Liza Tietjen and I also created an online exhibition celebrating Monumenta's 50th anniversary.
